Lessons and Hymns for this Sunday, January 7, 2018
(First Sunday after Epiphany - Year B)

THE SCRIPTURE LESSONS:

First Lesson: Genesis 1:1-5. The opening story of God's creation of the world and the creation of day and night. **The Psalm:** Psalm 29. This is a song about God's creation. **Second Lesson:** Acts 19:1-7. Paul baptizes some of John the Baptist's converts and the city of Ephesus. **The Gospel:** Mark 1:4-11. The story of the ministry and preaching of John the Baptist in the Gospel according to Mark.

THE HYMNS:

Processional: No. 135. "Songs of thankfulness and praise." Christopher Wordsworth, Bishop of London and nephew of the poet, William Wordsworth, wrote this hymn for the sixth Sunday I after the Epiphany. The fourth verse was written and added by Francis Bland Tucker, an Episcopal priest who authored and translated many hymns and helped develop the 1940 hymnal. The tune, "Salzburg," was composed by Jakob Hintze and later harmonized by Johann Sebastian Bach.

Sequence: No. 381. "Thy strong word did cleave the darkness." This hymn was written by Martin H. Franzman (1907-1976), a graduate of Northwestern College and later studied at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary. He served on the faculty of Northwestern College; Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri; and finally traveled to England where he served as a tutor at Westfield House, the theological college of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of England until his death in 1976. The tune, "Ton-y-Botel," was composed by Thomas John Williams (1869-1944), organist and choirmaster of two parishes in Llanelly, a village in southeast Wales. The melody is moving and stately and perhaps one of the most sung at the heavenly banquet-every Christian should be able to sing this with spirit and joy.

Presentation: No. 117. "Brightest and best." This hymn was written by Reginald Heber, an Anglican priest who became Bishop of Calcutta, India in 1823. A prolific musician and author of hymns, the church has variously enjoyed a dozen of his hymns, the most popular being, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty (Hymn 362 in the 1982 Hymnal). "Brightest and best" was criticized by some hymnal editors for seeming to promote worship of the stars.

Communion: "In the Lord I'll be forever thankful." This hymn was written and set to music by Jacques Breathier for the Taize religious community in France. 1991. It is based on Philippians 4:4-6.

Recessional: No. 119. "As with gladness." William Chatterton Dix wrote this hymn on his sick bed in the middle 19th century. He was reading the story of the visit of the Magi in the Gospel according to St. Matthew and came up with the words. The tune "Dix" was composed by Conrad Kocher who lived in Stuttgart, Germany.


